Guiding Our Path Forward: Mike Penfold Named New President

Bringing a Lifetime of Leadership to the Helm



At the April 2025 board meeting, longtime conservationist and public lands advocate Mike Penfold was officially named President of Our Montana. With nearly six decades of public service—including leadership roles as State Director of the Bureau of Land Management in both Montana and Alaska—Mike has helped shape some of the most impactful conservation and public access policies in the western United States.

Since joining Our Montana, Mike has been a steady presence and guiding voice, working to expand public access along the Yellowstone River, support historic trail documentation, and foster cross-agency collaboration on cultural and environmental initiatives. He's also the host of Our Montana on Community 7 TV, where he shares stories that deepen public understanding of the state's rich landscapes and heritage.





New Yellowstone Watershed Initiative

Uniting partners across Montana to protect the river's health and future



Uniting for River Health & Conservation Our Montana, Yellowstone River Parks Association and the Yellowstone River Research Center, at Rocky Mountain College are spearheading a new initiative: the formation of a Yellowstone River Watershed Group. This collaborative effort will bring together community leaders, scientists, stakeholders and conservationists to protect and restore the

health of the Yellowstone River and its surrounding landscapes.

The group will explore partnerships with local Conservation Districts and other stakeholders to address pressing ecological challenges—including oil spill prevention, stormwater runoff, the spread of invasive plant species and issues concerning the sustainability of the Yellowstone River.

Early planning is already underway, and we're excited about the potential for grant funding and regional collaboration to move this vision forward.


Coulson "Boothill" **Cemetery Restoration: Project Progress and Updates!**

Spearheaded by Dave Wanzenried whose vision, dedication, and leadership have made this project possible—the Boot Hill Cemetery project continues to grow into a vibrant tribute to Montana's past. With the help of dedicated volunteers and community collaboration, this historic site has been revitalized through thoughtful restoration, improved signage, and new educational tools.

Recent efforts include a major site cleanup and preparation for a new informational kiosk—complete with a map and QR code access to deeper stories about the people and events that shaped the area. This digital expansion is part of a broader initiative to connect visitors with Montana's rich history through accessible, engaging experiences.

Future plans include integrating Boot Hill into a larger network of digitally connected heritage sites using QR codes that link to maps, images, and historical context. This innovative approach helps tell Montana's story in a more interactive way while reducing the need for excessive physical signage.

These efforts are part of Our Montana's broader mission to preserve and share the cultural heritage of the region, and we're grateful to everyone who has contributed their time, energy, and expertise to help bring this meaningful work to life.

This summer, board member Jaeger Held steps into a new role as an interpretive ranger at Fort Laramie National Historic Site in southeast Wyoming. Once a pivotal 19th-century trading post and military fort along the Oregon, California, and Mormon Trails, Fort Laramie now welcomes visitors from around the world to learn about frontier life, Plains Tribes, and westward expansion.

As an interpretive ranger, Jaeger will lead guided walks, present living-history programs, and help visitors connect the fort's stories to the broader history of the American West—experience he'll bring back to Our Montana projects.

Bozeman Trail Book Heads to Print!

Mapping Montana's Historic Pathways

Ralph Saunders has finished his deep-dive manuscript, The Bozeman Trail in Montana—the first comprehensive mapping of the 535-mile route since the 1860s. Drawing on pioneer diaries, wagon-route forensics, and modern drone imagery, Ralph pinpoints the exact corridor settlers followed on their rush to Montana's goldfields.

At our April board meeting, members voted to move the project into the printing phase, setting aside funds to produce a high-quality, photo-rich edition. Once the print vendor is selected, copies will be shared with museums, libraries, classrooms, and partner trails groups so more people can explore this pivotal chapter of Western history.

Bison Recovery: Big Goals, Big Landscapes Championing Wildlife on Montana's Expansive Plains




At our recent board meeting, Don Woerner shared powerful insights into the future of wild bison in Montana and beyond. As both a rancher and conservationist, Don continues to advocate for the return of large-scale, free-ranging herds to the vast landscapes that once supported them.

Highlights from his update include:

- Restoration goals in places like the Charles M. Russell (CMR) Wildlife Refuge, Wind River Range, and northern Big Horn Mountains.
- The need for public education to help people understand bison not as livestock, but as native wildlife requiring space, balance, and thoughtful management.
- Updates on ongoing challenges: disease control, land access, and navigating the complex policies surrounding bison herd stewardship.


